



The Industrial Hemp Farming Act of 2013

This bill would create jobs by reducing federal regulations on agricultural hemp production. Current law requires all hemp products to be imported.

H.R. 525 and S.359 have broad bipartisan support from 40+ members of Congress, including **Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell** and **Agriculture Committee Ranking Member Collin Peterson**.

The Industrial Hemp Farming Act would:

- **Return power to states** to regulate approved varieties of non-drug agricultural hemp.
- **Create Jobs** by domestically producing and processing raw materials and finished products.
- **Give new opportunities to farmers** to grow a versatile, low input, and profitable rotation crop.
- **Open the market** for businesses and entrepreneurs with thousands of products.

Why Now?

- The U.S. retail market for hemp products now **exceeds \$500 million annually**.
- **Nineteen states have introduced hemp legislation** as of April, 2013. Before 2013, **nineteen states** had already passed hemp legislation.
- From 2012 to 2013, hemp food and body care sales grew **16.5%**. **30% of Mercedes Benz manufactured** contain biocomposite made with industrial hemp.
- Market growth, bipartisan support, and public awareness continue to increase in domestically and globally.

Made in the USA

- The U.S. is the only developed nation to ban hemp farming, meaning that U.S. companies must import hemp from Canada, China, and Europe.
- Canadian farmers report profits of ~\$200+/ acre, and also take advantage of the agricultural and ecological benefits of hemp farming. In the US, hemp varieties can be grown in all 50 states.
- Major groups including the **National Farmers Union**, the **National Association of State Departments of Agriculture**, and the **California State Sheriffs' Association** have endorsed hemp farming.
